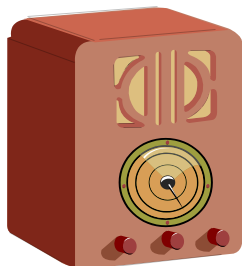

Baby boomers will probably remember items of "white bumpy glass" sitting around the house. These nostalgic pieces, known as Milk Glass Hobnail, were produced by the Fenton Art Glass Company and are now highly collectible. Bright red, or gray or aqua/teal-colored 1950s chrome and vinyl kitchen sets will be on hand, perfect for those seeking retro-revival pieces.

Jewelry divas will be able to search for vintage and costume jewelry designers such as Trifari, Haskell, Eisenberg, Coro, Hobe, Boucher, DeMario, and Weiss or Victorian, Arts & Crafts, Deco, Czech and Bakelite styles.

Senior Pastor's Report

Faithfulness and Worship

Being a child of God and a member of his Body on earth, the church, is a privilege that carries with it responsibilities. At every baptismal service, parents and godparents vow to “be responsible for seeing that the child [they] present is brought up in the Christian faith and life” and “by [their] prayers and witness help this child to grow into the full stature of Christ.” We all then renew our vows as well to be faithful in continuing “in the apostles’ teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers,” in other words, being faithful in our regular worship and participation in the life to our Christian community.

There are three traditional reasons for not joining our brothers and sisters in Christ in worship on Sunday (this includes Saturday evening worship): illness, impossible distance, or being involved in a notable act of charitable service instead.

There is increasing cultural competition with regular worship on Sundays. In our nation, Sunday is no longer honored as a day of worship and rest. It is seen primarily as a day for recreation, sports, household chores, etc.

How we actually spend our time is a much greater indicator of our real values than what we profess.

I encourage all of us to be true to our baptisms and desire to know God and Jesus’ love for us. He is always there for us. Let us be there with him and his family as many Sundays as able.

Dear Calvary Households,

As we pass the mid-point of 2011, there is both good news and challenging news regarding Calvary’s finances.

The good news is:

- Regular giving from parishioners is a bit above the anticipated amount at this time of the year!

The challenging news is:

- Our other anticipated streams of income (e.g., facility rental, special gifts to the General Fund) are behind budgeted amounts.
- Summer time is historically a time of financial challenge, and this summer is no different.

The net result is:

- As of the end of June, we are down \$15,000 from where we had planned to be.
- This, added to last year’s shortfall of close to \$15,000, leaves us with very tight cash reserves for our monthly operations. We have a line of credit. Tapping into it is far from free, however, and we really don’t want to do that.
- What would be absolutely wonderful would be to generate a \$30,000 boost to our General Fund.

What’s needed:

- PLEASE keep current with your financial pledge/commitment to our work at Calvary. This is especially important during the summer and early fall months.

Kids Korner

Raising Kids with Character that Lasts

We all want our children to grow up with a sense of integrity, but how do we, as guardians of their care, make sure they possess this important character trait? Let's start with the word itself. Most people think of integrity as honesty. Although honesty has a lot to do with it, the word means more than this alone. According to co-authors Yates, J. and Yates, S. (1992), "Integrity means trustworthiness, objectivity, fair-mindedness, sincerity, scrupulousness, and thoroughness...a person of integrity is genuine – what you see is what you get". More than good or bad, integrity is about a sense of purity. Our goal as caretakers should be that our children have such a sense of integrity that when we send them out into the world it is instinctual. In other words, it is a part of their core being.

What can we do, though, to ensure our children possess integrity? For one, it starts with us. Our children will come know what integrity is when they witness our behavior towards them, our spouses, and towards others. We are shaping them through our own actions and behaviors. Does this mean that we should be perfect? Absolutely not! Having integrity is about admitting we are wrong when we have done something that has hurt another. We should strive to live to the highest standard that God calls us to be, but when we fail we should confess it. Yates & Yates state, "Genuine integrity maintains a high standard while acknowledging failure and seeking to grow". Our children will come to learn about integrity when we acknowledge our own shortcomings and weaknesses, all the while working towards the highest of standards.

Yates and Yates suggest that there are four ingredients to living a life of integrity: humility, consistency, trustworthiness, and honesty. A humble person is one who is comfortable with who they are and does not feel the need to pretend to be someone else depending on the environment they are in. At home we need to create a place where there is open honesty which encourages approachability and acceptance even when we fail. Do we allow our family members to talk openly about their shortcomings and temptations? Do we encourage our children to be honest with themselves about the things in which they do not excel? Do we push our children to be something they are not? Do we love our children just the way they are? God may not approve of everything we choose to do in life, but he completely accepts us for who we are. As parents, we must create an environment of acceptance, love, and openness so

that our children become humble before the Lord and admit their shortcomings and failures.

Consistency means treating everyone the same no matter what environment we are in. Do we treat our children, our spouse, our co-workers the same as we treat our best friend? Do we act the same towards others at church as we do on Mondays to families or co-workers? Do we watch our language at church as well as at home? Our children learn to have consistency when we model it for them in our own lives. The same is true with trustworthiness. If we want our children to maintain confidentiality, then we need to take care not to break confidentiality ourselves. Do we speak of others behind their backs? Do we share secrets others have confided to us? Although our children need to learn that some secrets must be spoken, most should remain confidential when appropriate. Our children need to know they can trust us and, as a result, others will trust them.

The final ingredient is honesty. How do we instill honesty in our children? For one, notice when they have lied, cheated, or stolen and when you do, take action, even if this means they need to correct the mistake by returning the item or admitting the mistake to the person they cheated. It is better they learn the lesson the hard way when they are young. Create an environment that communicates these actions are not tolerated and that there will be consequences when they break this rule. In addition, we need to ensure we are living up to this standard as well. Do we lie when receive a phone call we don't want to take? Do we keep the extra money the teller gave us? Do we "fudge" on our taxes? When we are honest in our dealings with others, our children learn to be honest to us and others. Would we want it any other way?

I know that as a parent I am not perfect. I know that I have failed in all these aspects, even in front of my own children. However, it is the action I take following these failures that will impact my children in their own lives. If I choose to ignore the wrong I have done then my children will learn that it is OK to ignore it. However, if I choose to acknowledge that I have done wrong then I am instilling in my children a sense of integrity. Which do you choose?

It also goes to great lengths to explain Jesus’ relationship to the Jewish faith and the Old Testament – a fascinating topic in its own right. The men's group will take a close look at the first four chapters of the Gospel of Matthew which asks such questions as: What significance does this first-century Jewish rabbi have for our lives today? This study also looks at the importance of obedience to God, the power of Jesus' name, living outside our comfort zone, gaining power over temptation, discovering what God expects of us, and staying on task with our mission.

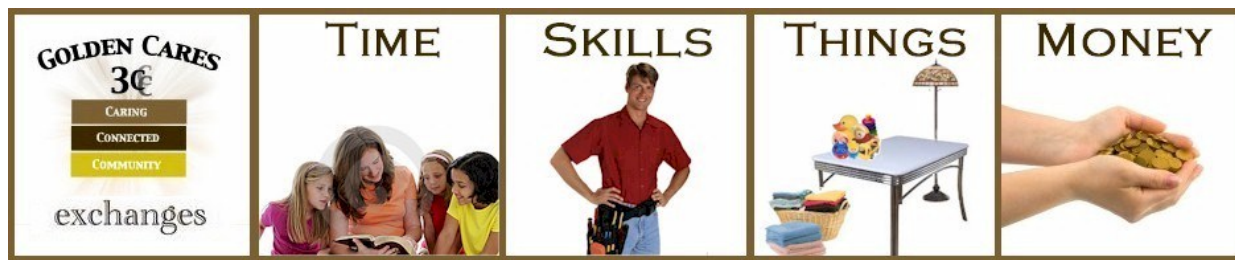

- 👉 **Stay on budget** – keep and load a card for each budgetary item such as groceries, gas, prescriptions
- 👉 **Stay cool** – use your card to purchase from in-store Starbucks
- 👉 **Include all household members** – the primary grocery shopper isn't the only one that needs one; pick one up for your spouse today!

For those that are not aware of the gift card program, here is a summary. If you use a Calvary reloadable King Soopers gift card to purchase groceries, gas, prescriptions, even items at in-store Starbucks, Calvary receives 5% of the total! We also have Safeway gift cards available for purchase at the face value of the cards. Calvary receives 4% of the total for these cards. It seems small but the amounts can add up quickly and are a great alternative source of income for the church. Seems like a no-brainer to me when I am already spending that grocery and gas money anyhow. We will continue the sales of both King Soopers and Safeway gift cards on Sunday mornings (Patrice Adamson sells the cards every other Sunday outside the Great Hall during the 10:10 AM-11AM fellowship time) in addition to the distribution of the \$2.50 cards. Mission Opportunity:

Installing Water Filters on the Pine Ridge Reservation in South Dakota



The Calvary Outreach Team has been planning a mission trip with Linda Smith, a member of our church, who is the Director of Filters for Families, a non-profit that has done extensive, and successful, work in Nepal to install water filters to remove toxic heavy metals from drinking water.

She is now focusing on addressing similar water issues in the Pine Ridge Reservation, in South Dakota. This month, she is leading a group from Calvary to help install approximately 20 filters and educate residents in the Pine Ridge area about the importance of drinking clean water. We have 2 people who are participating, but still need 5 more people to “complete” our group.

Here are the details:

When: Leave Golden on 8/26/11 - return to Golden on 8/31/11

Where: Stay in Pine Ridge (do work in Porcupine, Batesland and Wounded Knee)

Who: People w/ home repair/plumbing experience and people to do training, education

Travel: By car...about a 7 hour drive (time includes a stop for lunch)

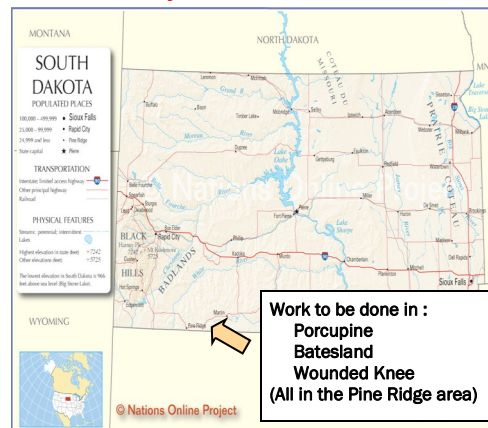
Lodging Cost: Up to \$10/ night for lodging at the Presbyterian Retreat House in Pine Ridge

(Some of the women may stay free at the local “old folks” home.)

Food Cost: We will buy and prepare most of our own, may eat dinner out (subs or pizza are the options)

BIKE RACE

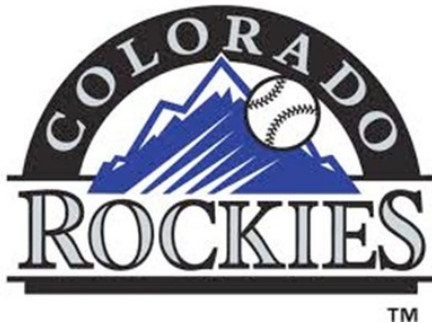
