## OUR MINES CONNECTION

When newly consecrated Bishop George M Randall arrived in Golden on June 11, 1866, he immediately noted the lack of higher education facilities in Colorado. After laying the cornerstone for Calvary in 1867, he began planning for a university which would include a school of mines to support the local industry, a collegiate grammar and military school for boys and a seminary. In 1868, he received a donation of ten acres about a mile south of Calvary, and his old friend, George Jarvis, donated \$5,000 for the construction of a building for the college. The cornerstone for Jarvis Hall was laid in 1869 by Bishop Randall and William Lynd, the first Rector of Calvary, and in 1870, Bishop Randall, under the auspices of the Episcopal Church, opened the first Colorado public institution of higher learning. The original buildings on the campus, called the Colorado University Schools, included Jarvis Hall Collegiate School, Matthews Hall Divinity School and the School of Mines. Within ten years, the faculties of Jarvis Hall and Matthews Hall moved to Denver and the School of Mines relocated to its present campus. Jurisdiction of the school passed from the Episcopal Church to Colorado Territory in 1874, and when Colorado attained statehood in 1876, it became a public state university.

Members of Calvary served on the original faculty, and over the years have participated in all aspects of CSM leadership: teaching, administration, Board of Trustees, and at least one school physician.

Calvary Church is proud to be a part of Bishop Randall's early vision of "laying foundations in this mighty empire of the west."

## CSM STUDENTS

Many students, from the very founding of CSM, have called Calvary their church home. Beyond attending worship services, they have also been involved in a variety of ways with the Calvary community, such as serving in different areas of ministry and outreach, being a member of the Young Adult Group or helping to lead worship. In 2001, Calvary started an outreach to students, called **Lunch & Life**. Attendance has grown over the years, and now, 40 members of Calvary gather each week during the school year to do everything from baking cookies and washing dishes, to talking with students and cooking, as well as offering God's love to about 350 students from many walks of life. Many of those students are now plugging into the Calvary community, as the lunch conveys that Calvary is a church that welcomes college students. It offers a soft introduction to the Gospel and Christian community for those who may have no church background, or for those more mature in their faith, it is a gathering place for connection, relationship and unity between the local churches and campus ministries.
